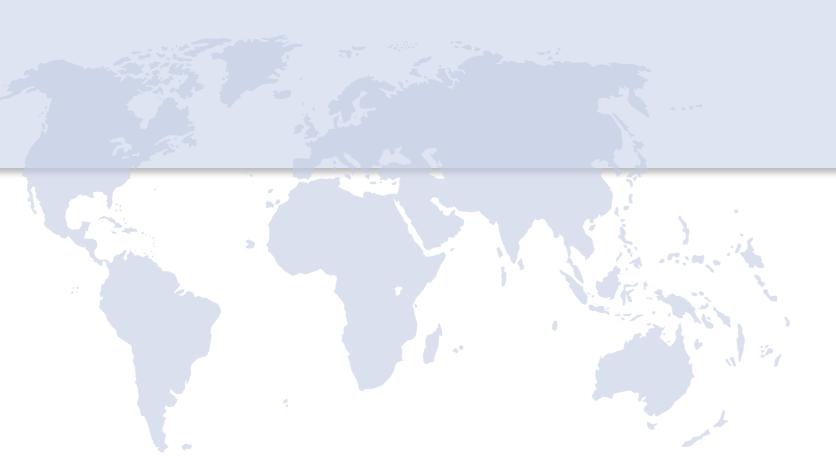

Success all along the line



SES can be more than content with its results from 2018. Each individual field developed outstandingly, both in terms of recruiting new Experts and, equally, in the work carried out during assignments.

Every month, nearly 130 experts registered with SES - more than ever before. Our assignment figures also exceeded all expectations, with 7,800 assignments taking place within and outside Germany - an increase of well over 1,000 on the previous year. This means 2018 returned the best result in the history of SES.

Particularly worthy of mention is that 2018 was the first year in which SES managed to carry out more than 2,000 international assignments, to which Weltdienst 30+, still a relatively new scheme, contributed significantly. The enormous success of the VerA training initiative also stands out. A good two thirds of all assignments in 2018 were accounted for by this mentoring programme.

At the end of June, on the occasion of the 10,000th training mentorship, an event was held in Berlin to celebrate VerA in commensurate style, at which First Lady Elke Büdenbender made the opening speech. In early December, the initiative's tenth anniversary celebration was also held in Bonn.

Two more significant birthdays also fell in 2018, to add to the highlights of the year: SES itself turned 35 on 31 January, and the SES Sponsors' Association reached the same age on 31 August.

All in all, we demonstrated once again that the concept of knowledge transfer by volunteers is a definite winner - in developing and newly industrialised countries no less than in Germany. This means SES can look to the future with great confidence. We also have the security of the reliable support we have received over three decades from both public and private benefactors.

Thanks

It is largely due to this support that SES is able to grow, year on year. Huge thanks are due to the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) and the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF). The financial contributions from these two organisations was what enabled most SES assignments to take place in 2018, as in previous years. Our thanks also go to Engagement Global - the national German service organisation for development initiatives - and to the Federal Institute for Vocational Education and Training (BIBB).

The SES owes deep gratitude to many members of both German and European parliaments. Particular thanks also go to the German Foreign Office, the German diplomatic missions abroad, the German Association for International Cooperation (GIZ), German industry and its main associations, the German Chambers of Industry and Commerce Abroad (AHKs), the Chambers of Skilled Trades and Crafts (HWKs), and the Chambers of Industry and Commerce (IHKs).

SES also offers heartfelt thanks to all those who support its work with donations, and those who make their premises available for use as offices, or for conferences and seminars. Ten years of VerA Top results in anniversary year

On 1 December 2018, the VerA Initiative, which exists to prevent trainees dropping out of their courses, turned ten years old. Over these ten years, this mentoring programme to encourage new talent, now established all over Germany, has grown into the most successful individual offering the SES provides.

In 2018 alone, 5,269 specialist workers in the making benefited from VerA. Over the whole ten years, there have been 13,238. These people all ran into problems during their training - problems that, thanks to VerA, could be overcome in over 70 percent of cases; in some years, in fact, in over 80 percent.

The secret of this success is the tandem model: individual mentoring by an Expert from SES. This help is offered by VerA to anyone who needs support taking their first steps towards a career. Age, origin and career path are not relevant.

Background

SES began its VerA initiative in and around Dresden and Munich. After a very short time it was able to expand this service to include Berlin, as well as the Rhine-Main and Ruhr areas. Since January 2011 it has been available across the whole of Germany.

The most important partners of SES in the VerA Initiative are the Federal Association of Independent Professions (BFB), the Association of German Chambers of Industry and Commerce (DIHK), the German Confederation of Skilled Crafts (ZDH) and the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF), which finances VerA within the framework of the Bildungsketten [education chains] initiative.

VerA goes to school in Europe

Since 2017, the project Mentoring Young Disadvantaged People for Inclusion (MYDI), financed by EU funds, has been developing tools to support young people, and, in this context, also with VerA. Within the framework of MYDI, SES and ten other organisations are working towards getting programmes started in Europe that will mirror VerA. Since March 2019, the initiative has been overseeing a pilot project in Lyon, and further tests are planned for other parts of France, as well as in Finland, Italy and Spain.

The future needs experience

Helping people to help themselves

SES has been promoting know-how transfer by volunteers since 1983. All around the world, its Experts use their specialist expertise and professional experience to offer people help in helping themselves. Their assignments take place in developing and newly industrialised countries, but also in Germany, where they mainly benefit those undergoing specialist training.

In 2018, SES Experts, both in Germany and abroad, completed around 161,300 assignment days. This figure rises every year – most recently, by a good 24 percent.

More interest than ever

With 1,524 registrations, SES gained more new Experts during 2018 than in any other year. Just under 130 new Experts were registered on average every month. This means the influx increased by more than seven percent.

By the end of the year, 12,956 Experts had placed their knowledge at our disposal. 1,033 of them are still working professionally, and are interested in Weltdienst 30+ assignments, a particularly fine result for the 'junior division' of SES, which was only established in 2017.

Equally pleasingly, the proportion of women has also risen once again. In 2000 it was six percent, and in 2005 nine percent, but by the end of 2018 it was over 20 percent. This upward trend can largely be traced back to the Weltdienst 30+ scheme. More than 42 percent of our younger SES specialists are women.

Know-how from 50 industries

SES can also be very content with the broad range of expertise that its Experts bring to the table. They hail from around 50 industries and several hundred individual professions. Skilled trades and crafts, trade and industry,

services and commerce, administration and public service, education and science: there is hardly a field that the SES cannot cover.

Expanding the register: a prime concern

Nevertheless, improving the database of Experts, in terms of both quantity and quality, is one of the most important tasks that SES must fulfil. Every year, many assignment requests go unmet because the necessary specialist knowledge or language skills are not sufficiently represented in our register of Experts.

Most urgently sought-after are specialists in skilled trades and crafts, and in healthcare. The same goes for anyone who knows their way around the German vocational training system, both in theory and in practice, or who can offer expertise relating to agriculture, renewable energies, plastics, mechanical engineering or foodstuffs. Across all fields, there is a great need for Experts with good foreign language skills.

SES tackles such shortages through targeted press and public relations campaigns, by directly approaching selected professional and specialist associations, and by networking with individual companies.

Improving regional cover

A further challenge comes from the large number of services that SES offers within Germany in order to prepare children, young people and trainees for their careers, as well as to help them integrate well into society. Complaints about people leaving school with no qualifications, a shortage of skilled workers and the huge task of offering prospects to young immigrants demonstrate the enormous significance of our engagement in this area.

With its programmes that encourage new talent within Germany, SES offers its Experts opportunities for assignments close to where they live. There are not enough Experts in rural areas, nor even in some urban agglomerations, where SES would like to engage yet further with the younger generation. Efforts will be intensified to recruit more specialists in these locations.

Tailor-made support

SES brings its 'Made in Germany' know-how into developing and newly industrialised countries via its international assignments. Its Experts provide support to small and medium-sized enterprises, educational and health-care establishments, public authorities and charitable organisations – always in response to demand, always tailored to the needs of the client, always on the principle of helping people to help themselves.

This system is the key to SES' success. It means SES assignments represent a valuable contribution to German collaborative development work. The German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) has rewarded this approach with over three decades of sustained support.

Exceeding all expectations

In 2018, SES carried out 2,039 assignments in 93 countries outside Germany, 241 of which were part of the Weltdienst 30+ scheme. An average of 170 Experts were dispatched every month. By the end of the year, the number of all assignments abroad since SES was founded had risen to 33,450.

These figures represent a record result for SES. Never before has it carried out more than 2,000 international assignments within a year. This is more than a 12-percent increase on the previous year. Meanwhile, the number of Weltdienst assignments has almost doubled – proof that our younger Expert service is also a hit among clients.

Africa and Asia in focus

There was high demand overall from all southern countries, but our projects in Africa south of the Sahara and in Asia have developed particularly well. Here we saw growth rates in the high double-digit range and particular interest in the Weltdienst 30+ programme. These regions also include the individual nations hosting the highest number of assignments: China, Indonesia, Kazakhstan and Tanzania.

All around the globe, SES prioritised local economies and concentrated on fighting poverty, vocational training, healthcare and agricultural development. In the manufacturing field, most assignments benefited the metalworking, foodstuffs and textile industries, while assignments in the service sector were mainly based on tourism.

A worldwide network

Part of the international success of SES can be traced back to the quality of its global contacts. By the end of 2018, its network of Representatives consisted of more than 200 people and institutions in over 90 countries – all important as initial points of contact for potential clients, as well as for clients who are already familiar with SES.

And SES sets an accordingly high value on regular exchanges of ideas and experiences with its Representatives. Since 2008, seminars in Bonn have proven invaluable in deepening our relationships with Representatives. Four of these workshops took place in 2018.

Follow-up assignments and post-assignment activities

In 2018, just under a fifth of all assignments abroad were part of a series of assignments, and thus classed as follow-up assignments. In addition, around 25 percent of the Experts we dispatched later supported "their" clients from Germany with post-assignment activities. They made contact with companies, assisted in the purchase of machines and spare parts, or acted as knowledgeable companions during visits to specialist trade fairs.

Positive external evaluation

The high proportion of follow-up assignments alone demonstrates how well received our services are. The evaluation results confirm this impression. They are based on questionnaires, which, as in previous years, were sent out in 2018 to both clients and Experts after every assignment.

Out of the 63 percent who responded, 95 percent of clients reported that the aim of the assignment had been either completely or partially achieved. 92 percent praised the collaboration with the SES Experts. 86 emphasised that the assignment had improved their own or their staff's expertise, and 82 percent expressed the wish for a further Expert assignment.

The SES Experts were slightly more modest in their assessment. Out of the 88 percent who responded, 81 percent said that the aim of the assignment had been met, either completely or partially. 80 percent considered it useful to run a follow-up assignment, and 67 percent underlined their willingness to engage in follow-up activities from Germany.

Coaching by the pros

Partners in business – mentoring the younger generation

As a foundation set up by German industry, with close links to its main associations, two topics are of particular concern to SES: supporting the private sector, and improving the prospects of the next generation of specialist workers.

Since as far back as 1990, SES has offered its assistance to small and medium-sized enterprises, charitable organisations and professional associations in solving technical, economic and organisational problems. For over ten years, it has also been engaging with young people in schools and on training courses – which is, today, its main focus within Germany.

Promoting young talent and aiding integration

SES undertakes a wide range of services for tomorrow's generation. Children and young people benefit from its schools programme, Neue Impulse für Schülerinnen und Schüler [A New Boost for Schoolchildren]. SES supports young adults with its VerA initiative, which exists to prevent trainees dropping out, and as a network partner of the national MobiPro-EU scheme, which makes it easier for trainees from EU countries to access dual vocational training schemes in Germany.

SES has also been more heavily involved since 2015 in the integration of immigrants into day-to-day school

and professional life. At a national level, it has also been cooperating with the Coordination Agency for Training and Migration (KAUSA) and the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF); and, at a federal state level, with the Baden-Württemberg Ministry of Culture, Youth and Sport.

Top results thanks to VerA

In 2018, our projects within Germany developed extremely well. In comparison with the previous year, the number of assignments grew by more than 18 percent to 5,826 – a result that we have never achieved before. This can primarily be traced back to the extremely encouraging reception experienced by the VerA training initiative.

Extending the schools programme

The schools programme, Neue Impulse für Schülerinnen und Schüler [A New Boost for Schoolchildren], also enjoys great popularity. This service, which is available to all types of school and all school years, has long been established in Baden-Württemberg, Hesse and North Rhine-Westphalia. Today, it exists in eleven federal states: including in Saarland, since 4 September 2018.

A New Boost for Schoolchildren brings the know-how of experienced specialists to both conventional and vocational schools. At the heart of the programme are projects that complement the standard curriculum, and

that improve the qualifications of young people – for example, by passing on hands-on skills, giving tutorials in the MINT subjects (mathematics, IT, natural sciences and technology), or support in choosing a career. Another big topic is helping young immigrants to integrate.

With its schools programme, SES not only wins over children, young people and teaching staff. It also becomes an 'eligible prospect' for funding, and has, for many years, been financed solely by donations and sponsorship. Support comes from a number of large corporate foundations, several firms, and many smaller donors, all of whom believe in the importance of nurturing the next generation at a local and regional level.

VerA: a flagship project

For several years, SES has been creating success stories with its VerA mentorship programme, which aims to prevent trainees dropping out. In 2018 it could hardly keep up with enquiries: the result is the impressive figure of well over 5,000 mentorships across Germany as a whole. This means the number of VerA mentorships has increased by more than 800 in comparison with 2017.

Every one of these pairings helps a person – and it is usually a very young person – who is finding their education difficult. This support is always helpful from an individual perspective, and it has enjoyed outstanding success: In 2018, over 70 percent of VerA mentees overcame their problems because they had an SES Expert by their side.

SES expects high demand for mentorships again in 2019, and many new tasks. In dealing with these, it is aided by the support of the German Education Ministry, which finances the VerA initiative, alongside collaboration with professional bodies and their umbrella associations who consider SES' commitment to future specialist workers invaluable.

Sites in Germany

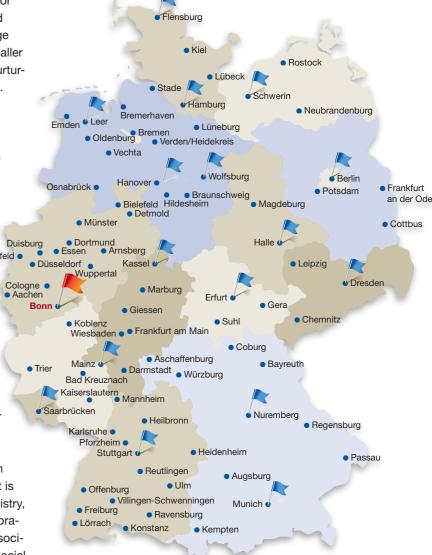
SES is represented throughout the whole of Germany: with 17 offices, many regional representatives and around 80 regional coordinators, the VerA initiative has a dense network of contacts at its disposal. This network acts as the basis for voluntary staff to maintain contact with Experts, companies, professional bodies and associations. They also support SES in its public relations work,

In 2018, no region of the world saw as many new assignments as Asia and Central Asia: there were 143 more assignments in 2018 than in the previous year. The greatest demand came from the fields of education, healthcare and business.

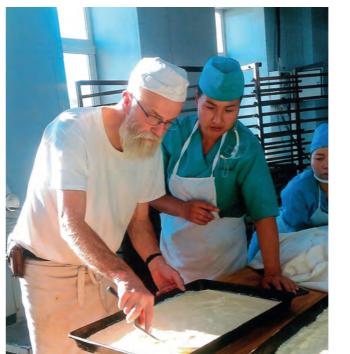

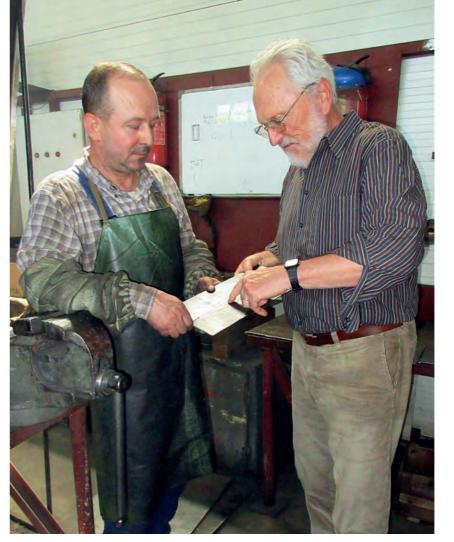

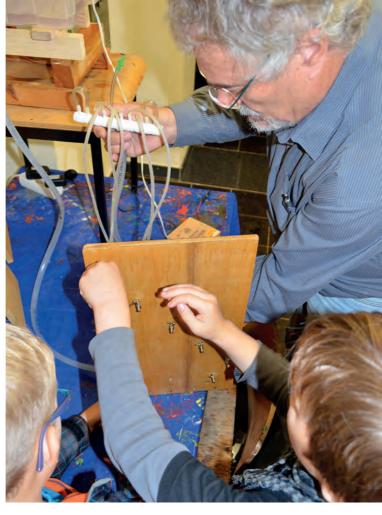

Overall performance and financial position

SES concluded the financial year 2018 with satisfactory results: income amounting to €14.832 million balanced out expenditure, which totalled €14.832 million. Turnover increased since 2017: by 18.7 percent. The background to this development is good assignment figures, as well as generous support once again by both public and private benefactors.

For instance, the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) provided sufficient funding for assignments abroad in developing and newly industrialised countries – some €10.136 million. Furthermore, the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF) financed the VerA training initiative

(€3.680 million), as well as providing €55,000 for assignments to support the state CoordinationAgency for Training and Migration (KAUSA). The SES Sponsors' Association also subsidised international assignments, to the tune of more than €47,500.

The schools programme A New Boost for School-children counts the following organisations among its most important supporters: the Otto Wolff Foundation (€35,000), the Globus Foundation (€11,100), the German BP Foundation (€7,150), the Pfennigsdorf Foundation (€5,000) and the Hanns Voith Foundation (€4,000). And our sponsor for assignments in 'welcome classes' for young refugees in Baden-Württemberg's

vocational schools, the Landesbank Baden-Württemberg (LBBW), stepped up to the mark again.

Spending on project costs amounted to €5.895 million, while staff costs rose to €5.883 million. The latter is mainly due to the expansion of the VerA initiative. Costs for materials climbed to €3.054 million.

Committed to quality

As in every year, in 2018 the SES placed particular value on continuing to develop its electronic data processing systems, and on the continued implementation

of the quality management procedures introduced in 2009. Investments such as these are essential for SES: they are in line with its self-image as a 'learning organisation'.

To this end, the efficiency and effectiveness of SES's work are regularly scrutinised, both internally and by its partners. The SES considers that it has a duty to maintain its work at a high level, on a long-term and sustainable basis, and to make improvements wherever possible. A close network of its own and external checks guarantees that SES uses the monies placed at its disposal correctly and that it constantly strives to improve its work.

The preliminary 2018 annual report of SES has been drawn up according to the regulations of the German Commercial Code (Handelsgesetzbuch – HGB) and has been examined by independent auditors. The local tax office has again acknowledged the charitable status of SES GmbH.

Creation of value through voluntary service

Various bodies are involved in financing SES assignments. Contributions in kind from German industry to support our work play an important role, as do the costs that are borne by the clients. These contributions - only some of which are included in the financial statement in accordance with commercial law - added up to a value of around €18.2 million in 2018. The voluntary work of the SES Experts is very difficult to put into figures in monetary terms. If every day of an assignment were valued at €250, and every meeting associated with mentoring young people at €40, then, with around 161,300 assignment days in 2018, we reach the approximate sum of €20.1 million. The public funds injected into the SES, on the other hand, totalled €14.3 million. Adding these sums together gives a value, for all the assignments carried out in 2018, of a good €52.6 million.

The greatest proportion of this value creation, 38 percent, came about through the voluntary commitment of the Experts. The proportion of contributions in kind from German industry and the costs borne by the clients added up to 35 percent, and the proportion of public funds was 27 percent. In 2018, as in previous years, public funding was matched several times over in the form of Experts' services and clients' contributions.

Organisational structure and tasks

The SES Foundation is the sole shareholder of SES GmbH. The SES Foundation, headquartered in Bonn, was founded in 2003 by the former shareholders of SES GmbH: the Federation of German Industries (BDI), the Confederation of German Employers' Associations (BDA), the Association of Chambers of Industry and Commerce (DIHK) and the German Confederation of Skilled Crafts (ZDH).

The bodies of the Foundation are the Board of Directors, Board of Trustees and Executive Director. The latter has a dual function, being responsible for the dealings of both the Foundation and the GmbH. The Foundation's Board of Directors authorises the financial and assignment planning of SES GmbH, approves the annual report, and authorises and approves the actions of the Executive Director. The Board of Trustees functions as the supervisory board of the Foundation. It supports and takes on some of the work of the Board of Directors, receives the statement of accounts, and advises on the development and business plan of SES GmbH.

The Board of Directors and Board of Trustees include high-ranking figures from the main associations representing German business, as well as the chief executives of two professional bodies, and well-known representatives of large companies. They all carry out their duties on a voluntary basis. They promote the work of SES and advise the Executive Director on all the most significant issues.

The Foundation's capital added up to more than a million euros at the end of 2018. Returns from this capital are used to benefit strategically important plans of the SES.

Parliamentary Lunch

The Parliamentary Lunch is an established fixture among the events brought in by the SES Foundation. The Foundation has hosted this meeting in Berlin every year since 2003 – traditionally in the Deutsche Parlamentarische Gesellschaft (the cross-party meeting place for German MPs).

The Parliamentary Lunch offers an opportunity for informal discussion between SES Experts and members of the German Parliament (Bundestag), along with ambassadors, ambassadors' associates, and guests from the various Federal Ministries and professional associations.

In 2018, the Parliamentary Lunch enjoyed the patronage of the former Federal Minister for Family Affairs and long-standing Chair of the German National Association of Senior Citizens' Associations (BAGSO), Prof. Ursula Lehr. The opening speech was made by the Federal Minister of Economic Cooperation and Development, Dr Gerd Müller.
